Shalom,

This has been a very dark year. As millions around the globe struggle with the effects of the coronavirus pandemic, all of the countries we at The Joshua Fund care so deeply about are struggling.

One-in-five Israelis are out of work. Not a single tourist is allowed in the country. Lebanon is trying desperately to recover from the horrific and deadly blast in August. Fear and confusion grow throughout the region. I'm regularly asked by pastors, ministry leaders, radio and TV hosts, and journalists what the Bible teaches on the subject of pestilence and plagues and whether they factor at all into the future prophecy.

I've been studying these issues carefully. After all, The Joshua Fund seeks to educate the Church, and those interested, in God's plan and purpose for Israel and her neighbors.

There is no doubt in my mind that the pandemic is one of the "birth pangs" of which the Lord Jesus spoke in Luke 21. It is yet another sign that we are living in what the Bible calls the "last days." That's why we need to have a sense of urgency to fulfill the Great Commission and specifically obey our calling to bless Israel and her neighbors in the name of Jesus.

Now is the time for the Church to be demonstrating the love of God in real and practical ways. One of our projects is providing food and humanitarian relief monthly to thousands of Israelis and Palestinians. These are needy widows, single mothers, Holocaust survivors, refugees, and other families struggling to make ends meet. This work is especially needed now; so many in our region have gone through a partial or full lockdown.

It is an honor to serve them – and I hope you are encouraged by the many stories of life change from the last year, all of which serve as a testimony of God's faithfulness through your faithful investment and prayers.

rom 9 years old to 90, Tanta
(aunt) Karima's* life has not
been easy. She comes out of
a Druze background, with a
prominent standing in society, and was
considered a princess. Her identification
card still bears the title of "Lady."

Tanta Karima is an older woman now, but she still remembers the day she came to Christ as a young girl.

She left her earthly royalty status behind to seek Christ. As a result, she was persecuted for her faith and rejected by her family. Her wealthy husband disowned her, leaving Karima penniless.

When Tanta Karima spoke to us, she did not share these stories but about the faithfulness of the Lord she loves.

"Listen to what I say. It's not from my thinking or my own experience. I shall tell you what God did for me while I was still young. Thank you, Lord, that you care for me all the time. How many times I was in danger, people were trying to kill me, but you stood beside me, and you saved me from all the trouble I've had in my life.


Thank you, Jesus. You are here today. We don't see you, but you are here listening to what I am going to say. You don't leave us on the road, as we do with rubbish. We are not rubbish with God. We are precious stones."

Tanta Karima's faith is strong, but her body is weak. She is nearing the end of her earthly days.

The compassion and kindness of partners like you led to Tanta Karima moving closer to the Christian community. They love and care for her—helping her live the remainder of her days with dignity and joy.

The Druze people have been one of the most unreached with the Gospel. The Joshua Fund continues to reach out to and minister to these people, just like Tanta Karima.





oneliness fueled by the
COVID-19 pandemic has led to
unprecedented depression levels.
Across the Middle East, shutdowns
plague the economy and force ministries to
rethink how they engage. Job losses force
many to make hard decisions that they likely
otherwise would not have made.

One thing is crystal clear to many Christian ministries: people need to feel love.

Miriam* is someone special to God, and needed the love of Christ. Miriam grew up in a Christian home in Nazareth; however, during her early adult life, she embraced communist ideals and became a devoted communist.

Sarah*, a member of a partner church sponsored by The Joshua Fund, contacted Miriam's mother after a family member visited a church service. Sarah began to frequently stop by Miriam's home to minister to her, pray, and to deliver food as needed.

Miriam witnessed the love of the church and felt drawn to the love of God. She started asking questions about Jesus and God's Word because she was very skeptical of religion and faith. However, because Miriam saw the love of Jesus in action, she was moved. Soon, she started attending church services and gave her life to Jesus. Hallelujah!

Soon tragedy struck when Miriam's mother died suddenly. Miriam had a crisis of faith, and she left the church.

Church members reached out to support Miriam during this time through prayer and regular visits and to show God's unconditional love despite the circumstances and sadness.

Sarah kept in touch and would regularly take Miriam food, pray for her over the phone, and visit her at home to support her.

One day, Sarah received a phone call from Miriam. She wanted to thank her for the love and care that she had shown her. Miriam also mentioned that she had started tuning into online church services. One service touched her so profoundly it even left her in tears. She felt the presence of the Holy Spirit.

Sarah asked if she wanted to pray, Miriam agreed. At that moment, Miriam rededicated her life to Christ. Then she once again began attending prayer meetings and church services.



magine your country was unwillingly thrust into two of the largest crises in our lifetime at the same time. That was the case for Lebanon. COVID-19, and the Beirut blast, wreaking havoc, in tandem. Fear and uncertainty ran through minds in the Middle East after a massive explosion rippled through Beirut, Lebanon, while dealing with significant health and economic crises.

August 4th, 2020, has been deeply etched in the minds of the people of Lebanon. A day when their beautiful capital city of Beirut exploded and was on fire. The lives of hundreds of thousands changed in a moment.

Nearly 200 people dead, 6,500 injured, and an estimated 300,000 people left homeless. The explosion destroyed grain silos with 15,000 tons of grain, leaving Lebanon with minimal food reserves.

While ministering in Lebanon just after this disaster, our Joshua Fund team had the opportunity to visit a "tent-home" of a Syrian refugee family. There, The Joshua Fund met a family surviving in deplorable conditions and who is now under the care of one of our Lebanese ministry partners. For our team, meeting Abdel* was a beautiful testimony of why your partnership with us was critical in Lebanon.

While we were there, Abdel shared, "we were completely out of food this past week when your group came with the food packages." "I had no idea how I would feed my family..."


Our hearts sank as we considered that! He continued... "My sister also attends the weekly Bible study, so we are so grateful for your group!" said Abdel, with tears in his eyes.



This year, because of your partnership we are working through the local Lebanese churches, and have provided hundreds of food packages to the suffering Lebanese and Syrian communities. This type of rapid response is critical in disaster situations like these.

so graciously with kind prayers and
compassionate gifts –thank you. We
know that another disaster is always
around the corner. We want to be
prepared with critically needed supplies.

eflect on your experiences as a young person, navigating university life and the transition to adulthood. If you were a believer then, your faith was no doubt challenged. Envision going through this in a setting where you have few peers who share your faith. Perhaps you would have secret struggles and wouldn't be confident you really understand your Bible. Many young believers in Israel experience these feelings. Add to that the sudden and disorienting shock of a world shutdown caused by a pandemic. But God provides for His people in ways that we do not expect!

"I received a new attitude to study God's Word! Such a deep understanding of every verse by knowing the cultural context and the [Old Testament]!"

One Joshua Fund partner recently planned a conference for believing university students. Students from Jewish, Arab, and other international backgrounds planning to attend the conference were set to learn how to inductively study the Word and

gain insights from each other and spiritual leaders. However, Israeli government restrictions to combat the virus threatened to bring everything to a screeching halt.

"My friend and I, filled with encouragement from the conference, decided to start studying the Bible... We're both so thankful," said one university student who attended the conference.

Rather than give up, the students and leaders chose to focus on what they could do and creatively continued the conference while upholding the quarantine. God ministered in unique ways. Students dove into the Scriptures and came away with a new understanding of their own ability to learn from the Word. Times of prayer and rededication to the Lord filled them with new resolve to follow Him. All of this happened despite circumstances that at first made it seem impossible.

We are grateful to hear testimonies of God working through difficult circumstances.

Within the book of Acts, we follow the Gospel from its humble beginnings to its unprecedented impact upon the Roman world. Not since the first century have we seen this process repeated.




